If possible, secure mentors and chambers before Course starts	Consider whether you are commencing practice immediately as this will determine what steps you need to take. Some Exam Takers may not have chambers organised pre-Course. This is okay, but it is highly recommended that you organise as much as possible before the Course as you will be busy preparing for the Course.	Free
Pay for the Bar Practice Course	You will typically be required to pay for the Bar Practice Course as per your Letter of Offer, once results are known. Approximately 6-8 weeks prior to the course. Develop your network	Take the opportunity before the BPC to reach out to solicitors/firms/in-house teams you know. You should also attend networking events and let colleagues/acquaintances know about your intentions. It assists at this stage to have an idea about what area/s you plan on practicing in. During Course		
Consider your living expenses	Ensure that you have enough savings to cover your living expenses for at least six (6) weeks (the BPC duration). You may also want to consider having savings for at least a couple of weeks after the BPC. Some Exam Takers have mentioned it was useful to keep the week before the course free so they could begin to prepare for the course. If you choose to do this, you will need to factor this into your savings plan. Please note that the Association makes no recommendation, guideline or statement as to	Calculate your personal expenses for at least six (6) weeks.
Prepare application for the grant of a practising certificate	when you should leave your employment – it is entirely your decision. Read the process for applying for a practising certificate (PC) on the Association's website and in particular the Association's Practising Certificate FAQ document found on the website https://qldbar.asn.au/practising-certificate If you intend to commence practice soon after completing the course, you should start preparing your application and gather the documentation that must be attached to the application. There is a helpful checklist on the last page of the application form.	Free (excluding application fees and costs of supporting documentation that is required)
Cancel your PC	There is no need to cancel any current practising certificate that you may hold. Please refer to the <u>Practising Certificate FAQ document</u> on our website for more information for seeking "in principle" approval of your practising certificate application.	Free
Order certificate of fitness and good standing	You require a certificate of good standing when applying for your PC. Please refer to the Practising Certificate FAQ document for the Association's requirements relating to practising certificate applications and supporting documentation, including certificates of fitness/standing or statement of status.	\$181.00 (QLS fee)
Purchase Professional Indemnity Insurance	You will need to purchase professional indemnity insurance of at least \$1.5 million, valid from no later than the date of your application for a PC until 30 June next, from one of the Association's approved insurers.	Depends on insurer.

Practising certificate and BAQ membership	Your PC is required for practice as a barrister. Detailed information about applying for a practising certificate, and the supporting documentation required, is in the Practising Certificate FAQ document available on our website.	\$677 for 2023/24 year for membership and practising certificate (may vary)
Email	You might like to arrange BarWeb to set-up your email (unless provided by your chamber group). This is the "@qldbar.asn.au" address. You will need to have a practising certificate before you can obtain the email. It costs, between \$30-\$90 per month, depending on capacity, and this is charged in three month periods in advance. https://barweb.net.au/applications/application-for-services/	\$30 - \$90 per month
BAQ membership and Supreme Court Library	 BAQ membership access a range of free library services online, in person, and by subscription, including: legal research - up to 30 minutes of free research assistance a day; document request service (copies of judgments and other documents not available online) - up to 10 free documents a day; and resource support and guidance - learn how to get the most out of the library's databases, collections and subscriptions. New barristers (called to the private bar less than 3 years ago) will also have access to the Virtual Legal Library (VLL). VLL provides free online access to over 100 key legal resources in the areas of civil, criminal and family law from leading publishers including LexisNexis, Thomson Reuters and CCH. Available publications include core commentary services, law reports, textbooks and journals. Upon payment of your membership to the Bar Association your details will be forwarded to the Supreme Court Library and they will contact you in relation to the services available. 	Free

Apply for entry to Register of Practitioner of the High Court	If you intend to practice in a federal court or tribunal, you will need to be entered on the Register of Practitioners of the High Court of Australia. Application for entry is free; however, the Registry will charge a practitioner to obtain a certificate of admission. http://www.hcourt.gov.au/registry/register-of-practitioners	\$125
	If you are already entered on the Register of Practitioners, you should ensure that your registration accords with your current entitlement to practice. Any person who previously practised as a solicitor, and was entered on the Register as such, should take steps to check and if necessary update their entry to a barrister.

Consider set up expenses	Business cards - You might want to purchase business cards (frequently used companies include VistaPrint and Moo.com)	\$50 to \$200 depending on quantity

	Legal wear – you will need a bar jacket, jabots (or tabs and collar), barrister robes and a wig.	\$2,750
	There are a number of providers in Queensland, including Ludlows and Stuart Suits. There are also providers online, for examples Regalia Wear.	

Post Course		
	Office furniture - You might need to purchase office furniture. To begin with consider the minimum requirements as a reader generally fills their office as the year progresses. As a starting point you might like to buy a desk, computer and chair.	\$1,000
	Some reader rooms will have built in furniture so this may not be required.	
	Online research tools - Consider online research tools that you may need.	Depends on research tools arranged

Ongoing Expenses	Reader rooms – the facilities associated with these rooms will vary. If phone lines and internet are not included, consider pre-paid mobile internet and relying on your mobile phone as your lease may only be for 12 months	\$2,500/month = \$30,000pa
	BarWeb Services (You should check that this is not organised by your chambers)	\$40/month = \$480pa
	Consider what networking events you might like to attend.	\$1,000pa
	CPD seminars/conferences. It is generally free for you to attend CPD seminars run by the Association.	\$1,000pa

	Accountant costs – Ask people in chambers who they use as there are accountants who specialise in and have expertise with Barristers	\$1,000 - \$2,000pa
	You should consider income protection insurance.	Depends on medical history
